The Holy Spirit calls us together as the people of God.

COMMEMORATION Feast of Creation

Throughout history, many human activities have contributed to the destruction of Creation. Yet today, more than ever, some human activities take the form of a war against Creation. Some hold greater responsibility for this crisis—elite consumption, exploitative business models, and economic theories prioritizing profit over sustainability. Pollution, health crises, deforestation, and mining in conflict zones worsen the situation.

Yet there is hope for a peaceful Earth. Isaiah 32:14-18 envisions a peaceful Creation where God's people live only when justice is achieved. The Lord's justice will dwell in the desert, God's righteousness lives in the fertile field (Isaiah 32:16). In the words of Archbishop Desmond Tutu: "Hope is being able to see that there is light - despite all the darkness."

Today begins the ecumenical Season of Creation, a season of prayer and action for our common home that takes place every year from September 1 to October 4 (ending on the Feast of Saint Francis of Assisi). During this year of the 1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed, Christians across the globe unite in working for peace with creation as an expression of this old and strong ecumenical communion.

GATHERING SONG

Butterfly - new students in all programs

Dragonfly - continuing students (not graduating) in all programs

Eagle – guests, partners, spouses, and family members

Owl – faculty (north sidewalk)

the rainstorms that drown crops and herds.
We beg you to heed the cries
of everyone suffering from flooding in the places we name now:
As you saved Noah and the animals from the deluge,
so now save those whose lives and livelihoods are threatened.
Dry up the wild waters, that the people may live.

All the waters are yours, O God, even stagnant rivers, and wells nearly dry, and lakes that are merely puddles.
We beg you to heed the cries of everyone suffering from drought in the places we name now: As you saved Hagar and Ishmael in the desert, so now save all those creatures dying of thirst.
Pour down rain and fill up the wells, that the people may live.

We ask you, almighty Provider, to give us the water we need, and we praise you for the sustenance you grant at this font. By the water of our baptism empower us to pour out ourselves for others and to safeguard the waters of your earth.

To you, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, Sea of holiness, Spring of salvation, Cloud of mystery, be all praise and thanksgiving, now and forever.

*In 1993, Wartburg Theological Seminary commissioned The Rev. Dr. Ralph F. Smith, Professor of Liturgics and Dean of the Chapel at that time, to write a hymn based on the WTS Mission Statement. Dr. Smith wrote At His Feet: Where Learning Leads to Mission and put his lyrics to the music of a well-known hymn tune, HOLY MANNA. The hymn was often included in worship during Prolog Weeks, Baccalaureate services, and Commencements. In 2021, Wartburg commissioned Michael Joncas to write new music for the hymn. The hymn, with its new music, was sung in worship for the first time at the Inauguration of President Kristin Johnston Largen. We give God thanks for this hymn and for the new music that accompanies it.
