



## KECUTVE SCMMARY



"Rooted and Renewing:" Wartburg Theological Seminary's Strategic Plan, 2024–2026

I am excited to introduce Wartburg Theological Seminary's new strategic plan, *Rooted and Renewing*.

*Rooted and Renewing* is the title of Professor Troy Troftgruben's recent book, in which he looks back at models and practices described in the New Testament and invites us to see their potential for helping recreate and strengthen the church in the 21st century.

**Rooted and Renewing**: It is a vibrant, hopeful metaphor that describes well Wartburg Seminary's understanding of our specific call in this moment to follow the Holy Spirit and participate in God's mission in the world. **Rooted and Renewing**: Wartburg is both rooted in our longstanding historical commitments, and also constantly renewing the strong theological formation that happens here.

There are three main areas of focus in this strategic plan: diversity, care, and communication.

By *diversity*, we mean cultivating an inclusive sense of belonging for all of God's children. *Rooted* in our historic commitments to the global church, cross-cultural engagement, and open questions, we are forming leaders who can nurture and accompany Christian communities and congregations as they become places of reconciliation, hope and bridge-building. The church's very nature is counter-cultural, as it brings people together as the body of Christ based not on affinity, convenience, similarity or shared political beliefs. The church is a group that God has chosen and called together to proclaim the gospel and serve the neighbor and stranger. Therefore, today, Wartburg Seminary is *renewing* our RIC, anti-racist and Indigenous-affirming commitments, forming the next generation of public ministers who can invite congregations to live in the gray and create more purple, forging unusual friendships and fostering challenging conversations. As we reach toward God's future, we will form resilient, adaptive leaders. Those leaders will be equipped well to serve in diverse and challenging contexts, respecting those contexts as they engage in dialogue that invites people into the liberating power of the gospel that empowers them to name and help dismantle structures of oppression. We will build on our work with Latine and rural ministries to broaden the pipeline of potential students to include and welcome those from many different communities and backgrounds.


By *care*, we mean intentionally tending to our most valuable resources: first and foremost, our students, staff, and faculty; and second, the physical campus we call home. We are investing in our community now for the sake of the future needs of the church. For 150+ years, we have been *rooted* here in Dubuque, lowa, with a beautiful campus that has had a recognizable profile for generations and also experienced many developments over the years, including our current renovation of Fritschel Hall. Now, we are *renewing* for the future from these roots, as we continue to work to integrate more green technologies in all aspects of our life together. At Wartburg, we cultivate a culture of gratitude and celebration, regularly taking time to thank and honor our faculty and staff. We continue to develop ways to implement enrichment events for faculty plan to engage in further training in both diverse pedagogies and assessment tools that are meant to address particular student needs and further support student formation.

Finally, by *communication* we are pointing to our plans to strengthen the connective tissue that binds us all together as church around the world, deepening historic partnerships and forging new ones, and sharing with clarity and joy our own identity—our mission, vision, and values that guide our work. *Rooted* in our longstanding relationships with both ELCA synods, offices, and congregations, and also LWF partner churches and communities, we are *renewing* our commitment to reach out to new communities to listen actively and learn about them, their cultures, and our own participation in systems of oppression. In so doing, we will engage deeply with all constituencies and communities to share who we are, where we are going, and what we know and profess about the liberating hope and joy of the gospel with the world and its peoples.

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Rission

#### Diversity

Latine (pronounced la·`ti-ne) is a gender-neutral form of the word Latino, created by LGBTQIA2S+, gender non-binary, and feminist communities in Spanish speaking countries. The objective of the term Latine is to remove gender from the Spanish word Latino, by replacing it with the gender-neutral Spanish letter E. At the same time, we recognize that those in the Latine community use a variety of words to define themselves, and we affirm that diversity.

#### **Hospitalidad Radical**

#### Latine

Latine (pronunciado la `ti-ne) es una forma género neútro de la palabra latino, creada por las comunidades LGBTQIA2S+, las de género no binario y feministas en los paises donde se habla Español. El objetivo del término Latine es el de remover el género de la palabra en Español Latino, al reemplazarse por la letra E en Español que denota neutralidad de género. #### **Radical Hospitality**

Radical hospitality follows Jesus Christ's own practices of both welcoming and being welcomed by insiders and outsiders, the social elite and the social outcasts, the rich and the poor, those with status and those without. In all cases, particular attention is given to creating a 7 space free of judgment and condemnation and fostering a community where the unconditional love of God is freely shared and experienced.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Statement

Called by Jesus Christ, the eternal Word of God, who is love and whose call to love expands beyond any boundaries we might place upon it, the DEI Task Force facilitates the work of the Wartburg Theological Seminary faculty, students, staff, and board members to attend more intentionally to issues of diversity, equity, and inclusion in all aspects of our life together, such that church and community leaders become people who:

- 1. Uplift and center voices that have been historically marginalized/oppressed/disadvantaged in the United States and around the world.
- 2. Nurture and sustain a deeper sense of belonging for all people in diverse contexts.
- 3. Develop greater individual intercultural competencies.

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4. Inspire and catalyze mutual transformation in public ministries and across the country and the world.

This work ultimately is not simply for Wartburg Seminary alone but serves the church in the world, as it flows from the call of Jesus Christ to faithful discipleship and the vision the ELCA has set for itself.



The Triune God commands that we love our neighbor and the sojourner among us as ourselves (Lev 19:18b, 34). When asked which commandment was the greatest commandment of the Torah (Mt 22:36–40), Jesus responded that it is to love God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all our mind (Deut 6:5), and a second, he said, is like it, to love your neighbor as yourself (Lev 19:18b). In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus adds precision to the interpretation of neighbor by clarifying how expansive this call to love is: "You have heard it said, You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy, but I say to you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you" (Mt 5:43–44). The call to love neighbor is the call to love all, extending so far to even include the person we consider an enemy.

Therefore, we acknowledge our call from God to honor the dignity of each person, to advocate for their full inclusion in the life and work of the Seminary, and to inspire leaders to speak up and out in proclamation of the gospel of Jesus Christ and the service of justice for all people. This work, done well, answers the call of Jesus to "love one another as I have loved you," and will draw all of us more deeply into the beautiful, loving, unbiased kingdom of God for which Jesus taught us to pray.


